As we reflect on the past year, I am filled with immense gratitude and pride for all we have accomplished together. It's been a year of growth, resilience, and collaboration, as we continued to pursue our mission to provide Food, Counseling and Connection to our community.

This year, we faced challenges that tested our resolve. Demand for our services continued to rise sharply, stretching our resources to the limit. Yet, thanks to your unwavering support—through donations, volunteerism, and advocacy—we continued providing high-quality, accessible services. I want to personally thank each of you for your generosity.

Some of our key achievements in 2024 include:

- Stretched to support 4,547 people with food, counseling and connection.
- Piloted stipends for 22 counseling interns and a paid Social Work internship program with PSU, increasing accessibility for diverse students.
- Collaborated with our neighbor Metropolitan Learning Center to provide counseling and nutritious food to PPS students and their families.

2025 promises to bring even greater challenges, especially for our most vulnerable neighbors, like our immigrant and LGBTQIA+ community members. As we enter our 60th year, I'm proud to say William Temple House will remain a beacon of support for anyone in need.

Counseling

Through our low-cost Counseling program, staff and interns support individuals, couples, and families with mental health challenges such as depression, anxiety, grief, identity and relationship struggles, major life changes, trauma, and more.

Social Services

Our Social Services program meets basic needs and helps neighbors connect to the support they need, wherever they are. With a commitment to keeping our services low-barrier, accessible, and welcoming to our diverse community, we've stretched to support more people in 2024.




